ARTIST BACKGROUND

Joanna Maddox a professional actress, singer, storyteller writes and performs dramatic portrayals of historical American women. She received a BFA in Drama from the University of Georgia. She has toured throughout the US and is an approved Touring Artist of the National Women's History Project and Fulton County Arts Council's School Arts Program. She has appeared in numerous national television and radio commercials, corporate videos and is a member of Screen Actor's Guild and AFTRA.

CURRICULUM CONNECTIONS

This program incorporates women's history and social studies; the time period covered is before the Civil War. Language arts can be introduced by students writing an essay about Harriet Tubman.

PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

- 1. To bring to life a legend in American History Harriet Tubman, who helped over 300 slaves gain their freedom on the Underground Railroad.
- 2. To create an awareness of the students of what it was really like to be a slave and work for free.
- 3. To present the true hardships of slavery.
- 4. To demonstrate the sheer will power, determination and perseverance of a woman who against

the odds gained her freedom.

PROGRAM SUMMARY

The life of Harriet Tubman, a Champion of Freedom, is dramatically portrayed from early childhood to adulthood. The audience travels back in time with Harriet as she describes her life as a slave. Harriet Tubman was born Araminta Ross around 1820. She worked as a house servant and a field hand on a plantation in Maryland. She escaped from the bonds of slavery in the summer of 1849, she traveled by night through Maryland, Delaware and finally to Philadelphia. She made 19 trips back down south to lead other slaves, including her parents, to freedom. She soon became known as the "Moses" of her people. Her trips were carefully planned and brilliantly executed by the use of the "Underground Railroad," an ever-changing series of secret hiding places.

During the Civil War Harriet Tubman served the Union Army as a spy, scout, and hospital nurse.

After the war she made her home in Auburn NY where she lived until her death on March 10, 1913.

VOCABULARY

<u>Plantation</u> – An agricultural estate worked by resident labor.

<u>Underground Railroad</u> – A loose network of antislavery people who secretly helped fugitive slaves reach the North and Canada.

Conductor - a person who serves as a guide to runaway slaves.

<u>Sleeping Spells</u> – Fainting or Blackouts that Harriet Tubman suffered caused by brain damage.

Slaves - People who are owned by other people and forced to work without pay.

Freedom- Not being subject to domination or control of someone else.

Quakers - Religious group of people that did not believe in slavery.

Slave State - A state in the U.S. in which slavery was legal before the Civil War.

OVERVIEW OF ART FORM

The art forms demonstrated in this program are storytelling, dramatic art and music.

Information presented in the narrative form is the information that will be remembered. Before television and radio people told stories and the ancient art of storytelling is making a comeback. Storytelling can be used to entertain, inspire, encourage, heal, and to pass down cultural history and information from generation to generation. Through stories people can connect, learn and appreciate each other's differences. Harriet Tubman used songs as messages to the alert prospective runaway slaves. Artist will sing several songs throughout the program.

PRE-ACTIVITIES

Students may read books from the resource guide.

Have discussions on what it was like to be a slave.

Discuss what freedom means to you.

POST ACTIVITIES

Watch the video, "A Woman called Moses."

Would you risk death to escape slavery?

Discuss whether or not slavery played a part in starting the Civil War?

Learn the poem "Harriet Tubman Didn't Take No Mess" and recite to class.

Read the book "Follow the Drinking Gourd."

Learn and sing the song "Follow the Drinking Gourd" a coded song that tells the escape route

from Alabama and Mississippi.

Take a US map and retrace the steps of Harriet Tubman.

Study a constellation map and discover how Harriet Tubman was able to find her way by following the North Star.

Take a virtual reality journey with Harriet Tubman on the Underground Railroad. (See Resources)

Discussion

Why did Harriet Tubman want to be free?

Why didn't she want to be a slave anymore?

Why did the Quaker woman help Harriet Tubman escape?

Why did Harriet risk her life to free other slaves?

Students may act out a scene with Harriet Tubman leading a group of slaves on the Underground

Railroad. Assign different characters.
